





We considered how precious bread is to us and were asked to share our favourite bread recipe, our favourite way of eating bread or our favourite bread story:

Slices of white or brown bread buttered then spread with orange marmalade, egg and milk poured over, leave for a short while then bake in the oven. This is very delicious!

Pain au chocolat from Monsieur Blondie in France – flaky and sweet!

My favourite recipe for bread is the one for making the harvest loaf and the instructions for construction. It takes time and is a good activity for contemplation

Syrup Ginger Pudding – S.R. Flour, ginger, salt, breadcrumbs, Golden Syrup, egg, milk Introducing an elderly friend to new breads! Leaving 50/50 behind now and enjoying sour dough with seeds

Soda Bread – love this! – speedy and tasty especially with Appleby's cheese! Walker's Granary!

My favourite recipe for bread and butter pudding by Mary Berry – brioche, cream, eggs, fruit Organic flour, water/milk starter – Mix and thump well, prove, put in tin, allow to rise, cook, EAT!

Bread and butter pudding -2 slices bread butter & marmalade, 1 egg, $\frac{1}{2}$ pint milk, vanilla essence, sugar and nutmeg

Crusty 'Tiger Bread' toasted and buttered!

My favourite sandwich – peanut butter, jam and banana on soda bread

Walker's granary, ham and salad

Soda Brown Bread with eggs and mushrooms cooked in olive oil

We also considered the nature of forgiveness colouring pieces of fabric marked with an 'x' to symbolise both the 'crossing out' of forgiveness and the blessing of a kiss (to be part of a banner one day hopefully); we walked a large 'labyrinth' cross contemplating the weight of evil in our lives and the impact of Christ's death on evil; and we wrote our prayers on folded paper hands which were brought to the altar with the bread and wine and offered to God.

We shared the peace formally within the service but felt that this had been truly experienced already in the fellowship of the morning, thanks be to God!

FTW JOINT SERVICE—Sunday 30th July 2023

The theme for our joint Benefice service on Sunday 30th July was the Lord's Prayer. It was a communion service and we sat in a large circle in Fauls Church Hall. Instead of a sermon we were encouraged to participate in a number of activities aimed at encouraging us to think through some of the familiar lines of the prayer. We tried our hands (literally!) at saying the prayer with Makaton signing. Another of our activities was to write a haiku on the theme of Heaven. A haiku is a poem with three lines; the first line has 5 syllables, the second line has 7 syllables and the third line has 5 syllables.

St Alkmund's is the parish church of Whitchurch and is a Grade I listed building. This is an opportunity to mount the many steps to the top of the church tower. The climb will take you past the ringing room and allow a view of the clock mechanism where an expert on Joyce's Clocks will explain its workings. Continue past the church bells before reaching the roof. The top of the tower affords a magnificent view of the surrounding countryside and diagrams identify major landmarks

THE LIGHTING OF THE CHURCH.

The committee to consider this question, which was appointed at the meeting of the Easter Vestry, assembled on May 5th. After discussing the question, and hearing what had been done in the matter in the past, the present system of lighting was carefully inspected. The meeting was adjourned to give the members opportunity of seeing how the churches in the county had solved the difficulty of effective lighting.

The position is really this: The present system of lighting is unsatisfactory. Many improvements in lighting large buildings have been made since this system was put in the church. And it is possible that the pipes need renewing, and that the standards are worn out. The

lighting is particularly bad in the galleries.

The first improvement that would suggest itself is to use incandescent mantles instead of the ordinary naked light. But in the case of most of the standards they are so loose and so shaky from their position that the mantles would get broken. And it is a question whether the pipes allow sufficient pressure of gas to pass for the illumination of the mantles.

If then it is decided to have incandescent mantles will it be necessary to have new brackets that cannot be shaken? This would also necessitate new pipes throughout the church to supply them with gas. Should there be brackets on the pillars, or should there be pendants from the galleries? And how should the galleries be best lighted?

Then, of course, there is another alternative. Should electricity be tried instead of gas? Electricity has much to recommend it. The handsome old chandeliers would once more come into use, and clusters of lights could be hung from any convenient place.

On the other hand there is no town's supply of electricity; and where could the church have its generating apparatus? Accumulators, a gas or oil engine, and a dynamo would be necessary. They would need a caretaker. They must be placed where the noise of the running was not an inconvenience. And electricity has the reputation of being more expensive than other forms of illumination.

There is a third system which is superseding electricity in lighting streets and such large places as railway stations: that is high-pressure gas. A machine is used that is run by a small gas engine that delivers the gas to the burner at a much higher pressure than it leaves the gasworks. This gives a better light, and is very economical in the use of gas.

So it will be seen that the committee have no easy task before them. They must choose a system that they can recommend as effective in its lighting of the church, and at the same time will not be too costly in its erection
