## Ezekiel 33: 23 then verse30 to Ch 34:10; Acts 26: 1, then verses 9 - 25

**Ezekiel is a prophet** who has been struck dumb by God. He is only able to speak if God has put the words into his mouth! In tonight's reading he is calling out the shepherds for failing to protect the sheep. For shepherds, read 'leaders'. The reading continues later in the chapter with God saying that he will take on the rescue of his sheep himself. God will be the shepherd.

Reading this from our standpoint, we see this prophecy come true in Jesus. And Jesus passed this role on to us when he said to Peter 'Feed my sheep'.

We must be mindful of what sort of shepherd we are.

In Acts we have Paul talking Christian faith to power, to King Agrippa – great grandson of the Herod of the Nativity story.

Interestingly it seems that Agrippa has a knowledge, maybe even an interest in the politics and faith arguments of the Jews. Paul even intimates in the next verses that he knows Agrippa believes in the Hebrew God.

God's word is for everyone – it is a complete leveller of those who are great or small in secular society. These divisions are destined to disappear before God.

God requires each of us, wherever we fall in the pecking order, to look first to ourselves, to lead lives that mimic that of his Good Shepherd, Jesus, caring for and feeding those in our care.

We are also called to speak out, to challenge those 'greater' than us. To call to account those abusing their position of power, those who seek to benefit themselves at the expense of others. He says that he will give us the words to do so.

Faith and politics are inextricably bound together, and people will know us by the way we express ourselves.

Our work is to bring to fruition the prayer Jesus gave us – that heaven should come to earth, its ways our ways.
