PASTORAL LETTER



Dear Friends

I hope that you were able to enjoy the Jubilee weekend. I wonder what your memories are and what you feel were the most important elements?

Many commentators focused on the 'coming together' – whether at the central celebrations in London or at local street parties in villages or towns. I think that this might indicate that these commentators themselves (as with so many people) tend to mix mainly or completely only with 'people like them'. Perhaps that's more likely to be true in towns and cities than in villages, but then villages are less likely to have a great diversity amongst their residents.

Why does this 'coming together' matter? Does it matter? One thing that strikes me as important is the greater understanding which can be generated. Meeting someone whose family is in Ukraine, and who is able to talk about them, deepens our awareness of what is happening to ordinary people there. We also learn about the knock on effect to some living in our own communities. Chatting to someone in the haulage industry brings a greater understanding of how the rise in fuel costs has a much wider effect than simply on our domestic energy bills. A 'chance' conversation with someone else, previously unknown to you, might bring a solution to a problem that's been bugging you for some time – perhaps a contact number for a tradesperson or an innovation for your garden.

In one of his letters, St Paul highlights the need for valuing diversity in the church (1 Corinthians 12) for the well-being both of the individual and the whole. I think this applies to each community too. Now that the Jubilee is over, are there ways to keep this 'coming together' alive within our communities?



Stonework Progress



Good news that the repairs to the stone are now completed and hopefully the scaffolding will soon be removed. The photographs show the replacement stone and repair that has been carried out. The cornice is a plaster moulded section and the open joints have been patch pointed, the stone has been fixed using chem-set glue and a lime mortar mix for pointing any open joints. The new stone held itself in position due to the nature of the curve, and the glue was a secondary precaution only.



Fauls Church

In the summer of 2021 we met to discuss a new project for our sewing group and after much discussion we eventually came to the decision to depict the four seasons onto 'banners' which would be hung from the balcony at the back of Holy Immanuel Church in Fauls. With this project we would be able to depict many of the flowers and plants that we see regularly as we walk along our country lanes, the opportunity for which we are very grateful.

Jane was tasked with producing a basic outline onto the fabric which consisted of a briar, some cow parsley, ferns and bracken and some grasses. In twos and threes we then added further plants to our fabric then appliqued and stitched our season adding beads and other embellishments as necessary to complete our banner.

The result was spring bursting with fresh hope, summer in all its fullness, the strong colours of autumn and the stark beauty of winter each linked by their unifying structure but with many individual components specific to their season.

The banners have now been hung in Holy Immanuel brightening the rear of the church as evidence of God's beautiful and bountiful world in which we live.

Spring was completed by Liz Allwood, Julia Davies and Heather Ridgway, summer by Liz Kempton and Freda Ridgway, autumn by Jill Palgrave and Jane Redwell and winter by Sue Armstrong and Joyce Chidlow all under the direction of Pat Salt, our mentor.

Bishop Michael, affirmed that he is "proud to be part of Diocese that takes Dementia-Friendly Church seriously", when he spoke at the Dementia-Friendly Churches Zoom Training Day in October 2020.

As a Dementia -Friendly Church, we are constant in our endeavours to maintain and improve our welcoming and friendly approach as an all inclusive place of worship 'All are welcome".

Reverend Judy -wrote (by invitation) published 6th June -. Dementia Friendly Churches Blog Diocese of Lichfield.

Revd Canon Dr Judy Hunt, Vicar of St Alkmund's, explains more about Time Together:

"We realised that there was no provision in the town or surrounding area for those with dementia and their family members or carers to do something together. This was the Start of a journey towards our (now very well established) Time Together group. We stated from the outset that the group was to provide spiritual support alongside mental, emotional and physical support. People new to the group or visiting for the first time almost always comment on the amount of laughter they hear. Writing this just before Pentecost, I'm reminded that some of the fruits of the Holy Spirit are hope, joy and love. Therefore, the laughter comes spontaneously for people who have found a safe and valued place in this group and who look forward to every session."

For my part as Dementia Coordinator -St Alkmund's. As part of a group of volunteers that contribute so much of their time and skills - under the guidance of Revd Judy - I find both challenging and a privilege.

Prayer Update April 2022

Dear Friends,

Happy Eastertide! Another late update as the month is already halfway through... It has been unbearably hot until this week and my energy levels have been low. I am so happy that now it is a few degrees cooler and we have had a variety of rain. I woke this morning to soft refreshing rain* and over the Easter weekend we had thunderstorms and heavy downpours.

I'm still working mostly from home but KEMRI HQ told us to go back to the office at the end of March. I've decided hybrid working is the best way. After months of discussions and me swotting up on micronutrient supplement doses and toxicity it looks like we will submit our study proposal to the Gates Foundation this week. I've been writing the background and study design whilst Martha has been finalizing the budget. This study is unlike any I've done before as it will involve a lot of blood sampling and lab assays. In my last 2 studies I've been interviewing mothers and



measuring children's growth and I much prefer talking to sticking needles in people. I will be site leader so the 24-strong field team will be doing the necessary. At least the blood tests will be on adults rather than children.

I haven't been affected much by the national fuel shortages, but petrol and diesel have been unavailable for 2



weeks. There's rationing of flour and milk. Most of Kenya's wheat is imported from the Ukraine and Russia. Increased milk price is due to reduced supply resulting from the drought which is described as potentially the worst in the Horn of and East Africa since 1981. We really need that rain to continue.
