PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Friends

For some of us, this is turning into a summer of weddings. There are family weddings (for me too as my nephew is getting married in Cambridge in the middle of July) or weddings of friends. There are weddings for which to do the admin, arrange flowers or clean; weddings at which to sing or bell-ring.

Many of these weddings have been delayed because of Covid-19; some have been brought forward because of family illnesses or concern about international travel this winter; some have been very different in numbers attending and 'style' because of Covid-19.

In conversations with the wedding couples, one common theme has emerged: "it's helped us to focus on what really matters". Between them, they've mentioned quite a few aspects of what really matters to them:

- We know that close friends will understand if they can't come it won't change our friendship
- Smaller numbers make the service more intimate
- The important thing is making our vows in church before God
- We really want to ensure that the family members who mean the most to us are there
- We can spend more time with people at the Reception if there are fewer it will be better in some ways
- Having to live through the pandemic and sort this out has strengthened the bond between us

There's been an overwhelmingly positive response, despite disappointments. Maybe this is to be expected from couples deeply in love – remember what St Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 13 v7: *"Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things."*

Let's consciously value the love that we can give and can receive – be it from spouse, friends, other family members, or animals and birds; and most of all, the love we can give to and receive from God. Love can help each one of us to respond positively to life and to see what remains good even amongst difficulties or disappointments.

DIOCESE OF

SHAPING FOR MISSION UPDATE:

Shaping for mission is a process intended to help churches and deaneries think missionally and consider what it is God is calling this area to be doing. This is split into three phases:

Phase 1 - Consultation

We have consulted far and wide around the deanery to ask for everyone's opinions and experiences of church and deanery life. we then presented this to Deanery Synod earlier this year. **Phase 2 - Vision**

We have been building on the review and consultation process to discern a vision for the deanery, including focusing on areas of strength to build on, areas to stop or change and areas where new approaches are needed.

The vision statement we discerned for the deanery is: "Filling our churches with confident disciples of Jesus Christ and be an effective Christian presence in our community".

As part of this we have been discussion what we would 'like to see' in an ideal world to facilitate this - this has involved discussions on administration, outreach, youthwork (including chaplaincy) and pastoral care.

We will be having another deanery synod a sort of "special" one in due course to discuss and present our Vision ahead of Phase three. **Phase 3**

We aren't quite at this point yet, but the bishops' staff will be working with the visions and helping us to develop strategies to move towards our vision, including allocation of resources.

Modern slavery: Sessions by Debbie Huxton Lichfield (diocese) and Noel Beattie and Chrissie Pepler (Hereford diocese) {notes Celia Churchill and Jill Wallace}



1. What has it got to do with me? Didn't slavery end in 1833 in the UK? Slavery has never ended but just changed shape.

Modern slavery is an umbrella term covering slavery, trafficking and exploitation 71% of modern slavery victims are women and children.

Definition: where ownership is exercised over another person.

Slavery is deceiving an individual first and then holding someone against their will or setting up an environment such that they cannot leave of their own volition: having power over them.

Trafficking is moving people across the world for the purpose of deception and bondage

Exploitation is taking advantage of someone's vulnerability to make illicit gains from them.

2. How does it impact on me?

- I was confronted with the fact that I would have a modern slavery foot print every time I bought items from merchants that did not guarantee a fair wage:
- The question put to me was: how many slaves work for me?
 So how many slaves work for you? See the link to follow. <u>https://slaveryfootprint.org/</u>

3. Different types of slavery:

- Psychological
- Sexual trafficking
- Organ harvesting
- Labour exploitation
- County lines: criminal activity in which drug dealers in major cities establish networks for supply and sale of drugs to users in rural areas. Typically children may be groomed and given mobile phones with new number so it is difficult for police to intervene and they are then used unwittingly used to carry drugs from one place to another. Schools aware and monitor as part of safeguarding

4. Where does it happen?

- Across all settings. Common settings are:
- Clothing factories like "Boohoo" Leicester (Guardian 3 Sept 2020)
- Hospitals, carers: where people without the correct qualifications are employed
- Construction: often working long hours without the correct safety equipment for little or no money
- Agriculture: farms, poultry factories
- Nail bars:
- Car washes: Are they very cheap, with an overseer watching work? High risk that there is exploitation.
- Beggars may also be in slavery : forced to beg by their owners who watch from afar.

5. Who can it happen to?

Anyone who is vulnerable:

if we ended up vulnerable due to change of circumstance it could happen to us!

6. What do we mean by vulnerable?

Needing to start a new life, needing a new job money, a way out just like anyone in a war torn country and potential refugee situation.

The individual is often enticed via social media to follow a lead that involves the promise of a new start in a better world and to do this they take loans from criminal gangs which then transport them into the UK illegally, treat them badly, exploit their labour and hold them in bondage: fear of violence from the gang master stops them challenging the situation a long with fear of the UK law: made worse by the Home Office "hostile environment policy": The victim is often fearful has got into debt because their owners have paid for them to be bought over to the UK and now the slave has to pay them money back which is impossible.



7. How would I recognise someone in modern slavery?

By physical appearance : personal neglect, person looks uncomfortable, anxious tense, fearful: isolated, reluctant to seek help, perhaps little English, appears controlled by someone else restricted freedom of movement : may travel at unusual times.

Examples of evidence in nail bar setting: are there mattresses by toilet. Does the employee rarely leave the nail bar..?

Do you pay less than £20 for nails to be painted? If so there is a high chance of exploitation

8. Doesn't it happen in big cities?

Yes but also in rural settings: examples : Morecambe Bay cockle shell pickers February 2004 North Shropshire: poultry farm workers held in bondage reported July 2019 Independent 39 Vietnamese suffocated in lorry in Essex reported October 2020 (Guardian)

9. How do I take action?

Trust your instinct and if in doubt report . <u>DO NOT INVESTIGATE YOURSELF</u>. If you do so you can put yourself and others at risk and can also destroy the opportunity for police to rescue the victim. Concerns should be reported- here are some places where you can report:

- Keep a diary if relevant e.g. times person seen, concerns, actions, for example your setting might be helping in a foodbank

10. Government action

Modern slavery Act 2015: section 54 of this act requires organisations to develop a slavery and human trafficking statement each year: the organisations have to set out what steps they are taking to ensure


modern slavery is not taking place either in their business or supply chains.

11. What Action will you take?

Will you be part of the solution? If in doubt report ! Marches anti -slavery partnership





Dear Friends,

Another month has gone by and I'm still mostly at home. Today's excitement was that I received 2 new pots and Jimmy came round and repotted my palms. It has also been raining this week which is a good thing here.

I received my second Covid vaccination last month so I can now be more outgoing. I need to do a reccy of the English service at church as I've been away since last year. The problem is that most Kilifi folk are not vaccinated and are rather casual about mask wearing and social distancing until the police fine them. People locally have not suffered or known anyone with severe Covid. Our



hospital still has vaccine supplies, probably because of vaccine hesitancy. Since the Covax supply line from India was interrupted Kenya has been searching elsewhere and Denmark is supplying 350,000 doses whilst the government tries to procure Johnson and Johnson vaccines for later this year.



At the Upendo board meeting one of our members Gladys, who is a headteacher told us of her visit to Fatuma, one of our sponsored children who is at a residential school for the blind on the South Coast. She has multiple special needs limiting her ability to look after herself and after 4 years she still cannot find her way around the school. The school are talking of sending her home or else suggested she go to another special school the other side of the country. It is so sad that there are no local facilities able to help her.

At work Martha and I have been having Zoom calls with consultants in Cambodia, Vietnam, Indonesia, and the Philippines to train them to do phone interviews with healthworkers. They all seem very keen and the pilot interviews went well. We are now waiting for the go ahead from the respective Ministries of Health to proceed. The aim is to find out how nutritionally at-risk young infants and their mothers are currently identified and treated. The next phase will be to do an online survey and phone interviews with policy makers. This work has been requested by UNICEF and the goal is that this will lead to changes in guidelines and improved care.


