

PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Friends

You may well have heard the term "the War Generation" and also 'the Baby Boomers'; you may be familiar with the terms of the X Generation or the Y Generation. I'm wondering if we'll all become known as the Covid Generation. What do you think?

Whatever age we are, this pandemic has had, and still is having, its effect:

- Babies born in March 2020 who have not yet seen another baby
- Primary school children with 'on/ off' in-school time
- GSCE pupils unsure about what assessment they will face
- First year students at universities or colleges with such a peculiar start to their life there
- Young adults often on furlough or made redundant
- Parents having to juggle home-schooling and their own work
- Key workers of all descriptions working flat out while others feel that their lives have become empty
- Grandparents not able to see their grandchildren
- Residents of Care Homes not able to have any visitors for long periods of time

In these and many other ways - we are the Covid Generation or Generations.

Whenever a lay or clergy person is licensed by the Bishop to any kind of authorised ministry, everyone present is reminded that the Church is called on to proclaim the faith "afresh in every generation".

So this our role in current times with the Covd Generation(s). It has certainly been a challenge in the last 12 months, and will continue to be so as we move forward. We have developed new ways of 'being church': in worship, prayer, nurture, pastoral care and outreach. A big thank you from me to all of you who have learnt new skills &/or have put old skills to new uses to enable this.

The stress of the ongoing pandemic and the stress of learning new ways to live in general and to minister within and to the various Covid Generations is real and will be taking its toll on all of us. So remember to be gentle with yourselves - to receive God's love and to love yourselves, along with that love and service of your neighbour. Living through circumstances that are new and different can be tiring even when the circumstances are good, positive and joyful - never mind the circumstances of coronavirus! Take time to do things that bring refreshment whether that be sitting down with a cup of tea, going out for a brisk walk or chatting with a friend by phone or Zoom.


Remember too, that when we begin to move out of this pandemic, it won't be a return to where we were in February 2020; we will then be the post Covid Generation(s): some of our friends or family have died, some may have long Covid syndrome, some may struggle with their mental health; for others there will be a need to find new employment. Some ways of doing things will have changed - and this could bring encouragement or not. Physical reunions will bring joy, but also a realisation of time lost. In all of this, Jesus is with us and will continue to be with us; in all of this, Jesus loves us and will continue to love us; in all of this, Jesus ministers to us and through us and will continue to minister to us and through us as we proclaim the faith "afresh in every generation".

In the meantime, remember to take time out and really enjoy the things that you can enjoy. Here's a quote from Matthew's Gospel (11 v28-30), paraphrased by Eugene Peterson in "The Message": Jesus says "Are you tired? Worn out? Burned out on religion? Come to me. Get away with me and you'll recover your life. I'll show you how to take a real rest. Walk with me and work with me - watch how I do it. Learn the unforced rhythms of grace. I won't lay anything heavy or ill-fitting on you. Keep company with me and you'll learn to live freely and lightly."

SHAPING FOR MISSION

Recently you may have heard about "Shaping for mission" across the deanery - I am part of the shaping for mission team and so this is a very brief article explaining what Shaping for Mission is, and where we are at the moment.

How does 'Shaping for Mission' Work?

Traditionally, the main driving force for mission has been individual churches and parishes. The Diocese is asking us to think bigger, by working together as clusters of parishes, known as

Our church is in the *Wem and Whitchurch Deanery*, which covers those two towns, plus a significant further chunk of North Shropshire

Although our deanery clergy meet together regularly and we have a deanery synod (which has traditionally acted as a link between the diocese and individual parishes), this will be a significant step up in the role that the deanery plays.

The group is coordinated by Rev Adam Clayton (Area dean) and Rev Rich Cresswell.

Where are we in the process?

There have been several meetings and we have started to create a "deanery review" document and agreed on a questionnaire for church members to fill in.

The first phase was this questionnaire and all of the response's deanery-wide will be used to help shape the mission across the deanery including where focus (and resources) would go to. The responses we received from the churches will then help us in the next stage, discerning a vision for mission that is faithful to God's call on us here.

What's next?

The second phase will begin in early 2021 when deaneries, Bishops' Senior Staff and APCMs will together begin the process of translating the vision into action and aligning resources accordingly.

The third phase will begin later in 2021 when deaneries and Bishop's Staff will work with the visions to develop strategies with each deanery to move towards their vision - This will include decisions about resourcing and staffing

It's an exciting opportunity to re-shape how mission and ministry is done across the deanery, and it offers us a "strong voice at the table" as it were when it comes to the allocation of resources.

How can I get involved?

Firstly - please pray. Pray that this will be a fruitful process and that God will use it for building His kingdom in this diocese, deanery and even across our benefice (Fauls, Tilstock and Whitchurch)

Secondly - I'd love to hear your thoughts on mission, on ministry, on outreach and on things that you think 'we do well' at the moment or where God might be leading - these can be fed into the process, either via the questionnaire - or if you've missed the deadline then I can feed some of them through.

Thirdly – Its really important that we don't view this as "just another diocese thing" and we do take it seriously, we get involved and we aim to consider the outcomes and the vision prayerfully and thoughtfully as, as a member of the team I can tell you, it is a very through process – thorough, prayed through and carefully discerned.

Finally - please pray for me - and my part in the team - that I may speak with wisdom and with God's spirit.

Dear brothers and sisters, It gives me much pleasure to write to you, on behalf of the wider Diocese, to thank you and your fellow parishioners so much for your 2020 parish share contributions.

To the Nation 26 January 2021

Dear friends

As we reach the terrible milestone of 100,000 deaths from COVID-19, we invite everyone in our nation to pause as we reflect on the enormity of this pandemic.

100,000 isn't just an abstract figure. Each number is a person: someone we loved and someone who loved us. We also believe that each of these people was known to God and cherished by God.

We write to you then in consolation, but also in encouragement, and ultimately in the hope of Jesus Christ. The God who comes to us in Jesus knew grief and suffering himself. On the cross, Jesus shares the weight of our sadness.

We therefore encourage everyone who is feeling scared, or lost or isolated to cast their fears on God. We also know that poorer communities, minority ethnic communities and those living with disabilities have been afflicted disproportionately and cry out for the healing of these inequalities. During this pandemic, we encourage everyone to do all they can to live within the guidelines and constraints given by government following the advice of the Chief Medical Officer and Chief Scientific Adviser. We show our commitment, care and love for one another by ensuring we do everything we can to stop the virus spreading.

None of this is easy. Very many of us are experiencing isolation, loneliness, anxiety and despondency like never before. Many people have lost their livelihoods. Our economy struggles. Also, the necessary restrictions we live with have also prevented us from being alongside loved ones as they died, or even at their graveside. All grief profoundly affects us, but this pandemic grief is so hard.

Therefore, we need to support each other. We do this by following the guidelines. But we also do it by reaching out to each other with care and kindness.

One thing we can all do is pray. We hope it is some consolation to know that the church prays for the life of our nation every day. Whether you're someone of faith, or not, we invite you to call on God in prayer. Starting on 1 Feb we invite you to set aside time every evening to pray, particularly at 6pm each day. More than ever, this is a time when we need to love each other. Prayer is an expression of love. A number of resources will be made available at www.ChurchofEngland.org/PrayerForTheNation. Finally, we write of hope. We are grateful for the hope we have because of the service of our NHS and social care staff. What a blessing and lifeline for our nation.

We are grateful for the service given in local communities by clergy, other frontline workers and so many good neighbours. We are grateful for the hope of the vaccine. It is a testimony to the God-given wisdom and gifts of scientists and researchers. We urge everyone to take the vaccine as soon as it is offered to you. Most of all, we have hope because God raised Jesus from the dead. This is the Christian hope that we will be celebrating at Easter. We live in the hope that we will share in his resurrection. Death doesn't have the last word. In God's kingdom every tear will be wiped away. Please be assured of our prayers. Please join us.





Crosslinks Alison Talbert (Jan 2021)

Dear Friends,



Schools fully re-opened on January 4th and the younger Upendo orphans are now on site 6 days a week. The secondary students have gone to their boarding schools. I visited the project this morning and it was lovely to be greeted by the little ones racing to the gate to see who could carry my bags. Social distancing and mask wearing were sadly lacking but John the tailor was there with new school uniforms and masks. The children looked blank when I asked them where the masks were that we'd handed out in March, obviously not used at home! Kenya's second Covid wave is on the



decline with test positivity rates around 3% since last week. Sickness levels due to Covid in Kilifi are low with most cases being asymptomatic. Kilifi County Hospital is closed due to the government nurses' and

clinical officers' strike over risk allowances and health insurance cover. Only the paediatric high dependency unit is open as that is staffed by KEMRI employees.

The research unit got back into the swing of things last week after the break with virtual seminars and committee meetings. I also "met up" with my Nigerian, Kenyan and UK neonatal nutrition network colleagues online and we have a new publication out. Other than writing papers and peer-reviewing other authors' work I don't have much work lined up for the rest of this month.

I give thanks for:

- The joy of seeing the Upendo children playing together again
- The full opening of, and the new teachers recruited for, Upendo Methodist schools
- Low levels of sickness in Kilifi

Please pray for:

- Wendy and her family as they mourn Lesley's death
- Our bible study group as we work out the most inclusive means of meeting up virtually
- Resolution of the healthworkers' strikes and provision for their healthcare costs
- Fair distribution of Covid-19 vaccine which is due to arrive in Kenya next month











MISSION PARTNERS

Freda Carey has sent us this:

Some encouragement from Pakistan.

Pakistan seems to be coming out of the second wave of Covid-19. Schools and colleges resumed their face to face classes from 1st February. Senior school classes (years 9 and 10) re-started on 18th January. We had just over two months of normal working between mid-September and late November, but



then went into a second lockdown, although it mainly affected educational institutions not churches. We have had normal services since the end of August, but the English language service is still being broadcast online for some families with young children and the elderly members. But the Sunday School has just resumed face to face, after being online for months. I will resume my interrupted classes on Pakistan Church History at the Gujranwala Theological Seminary in February. In the meantime the OTS class on Poverty and Development with the Christian High School teachers is going well, but because of lockdown they have not been able to do their field visits to the slums/shanty towns.

At the Open Theological Seminary, we are praising God for the successful completion in January of the third module, on Leadership and Stewardship, for the first cohort of the Master of Arts in Christian Studies (MACS) programme. This had been postponed since November due to Covid-19. The second MACS cohort started their first module, on Research Methods, in February, for which I am the main facilitator. We had over 40 applicants, which was very encouraging. I am still waiting for news of my visa application, but I am planning to come home for a few months this summer, depending on the Covd-19 situation. God bless you all, Freda


